REMOTE LEARNING IS NOT REGULAR SCHOOLING

It's different and we shouldn't expect it to be a digital version of face-to-face teaching. It's something that most people have not experienced. We won't get it right 100% of the time, but we will learn together. Established routines and work expectations remain though.



GOOD LEARNING AND TEACHING CONTINUES

The fundamentals of good learning and teaching remain the same. Student learning remains the focus. Feedback, inquiry, skill development, assessing understanding, growth, etc all continue while teachers adapt to new methods.



LEVERAGE DIGITAL FOR FAST FEEDBACK

A significant advantage of digital learning apps is their ability to provide fast feedback to students on their learning progress. Now is the time to leverage this technology to help students know how they are going.



MAXIMISE INVESTIGATION; PROBLEM-SOLVING AND INQUIRY

Remote learning presents an incredible opportunity to discover more about the world through the wonderful array of resources in homes, backyards and neighbourhoods. Also, with less timetable pressure, longer forms of learning become easier.



QUALITY OVER QUANTITY; LESS IS MORE

The experience from around the world in remote learning says that the pace of learning is different at home. Therefore, the emphasis here is on quality and not quantity. Year 7-10 students will have 3-4 hours' worth of work each day, while Year 11 & 12 students will follow the normal timetable.




FLEXIBLE LEARNING; LESS REAL-TIME

Learning at home will require more independence. There are key moments in the week when video conferences or certain tasks may require students to be active at a certain time, but most tasks should be time flexible (async).
